There is fierce competition to come up with the best idea, plus you need a topic that is considered appropriate for your level of education. For a high school project, students usually choose their own idea of the project, conduct an experiment and report results without much support to parents or teachers. Most high school projects are based on a scientific method. It is common to design and test a hypothesis. Projects with real applications are especially welcome. High school students can identify and solve problems in their communities. Problems may include topics such as resource availability, resource or efficiency costs, waste management or data collection. These ideas for science fair projects are organized by topic, but you may want to look at ideas by level of education. You can always re-spark your inspiration on the summer science program. Lead test kits are available in home stores. Are common products really unleaded? Items for testing may include toys, jewelry, handicrafts or cosmetics. Carbon monoxide detectors are also readily available. Test student homes for carbon monoxide (most commonly produced when houses are heated) and suggest ways to lower levels. Another option is to test different parts of the school! Identify common household products that pose a risk to the environment. What type of bulb is best in terms of cost? Which is the most environmentally friendly? Does night insects attract lamps because of heat or light? Can you identify any natural mosquito repellents? Does magnetism affect plant growth? Does the storage temperature affect the pH of the juice? Does the presence of cigarette smoke affect the rate of plant growth? Does breakfast affect school performance? Does it matter what you eat? To types of mold grow on all kinds of bread? Does light affect the speed at which foods spoil? Do foods containing preservatives stay fresh longer than foods without them? How does the time or season of harvest affect the chemistry and nutritional content of food? How long do home hair dye products hold their color? Does the brand matter? Does hair type affect colorfastness? How does previous treatment (permanent, previous coloring, straightening) affect the initial intensity of colors and color? Do all washing products produce the same amount of bubbles? Clean the same number of dishes? Is the nutritional content of different brands of vegetables (e.g. canned peas) the same? How permanent are permanent tags? Do plant-based repellents work, as do synthesized chemical repellents? What are some natural ways to color foods? Is the detergent effective if you use less than the recommended amount? More? Is bottled water cleaner than tap water? What type of invisible ink is the most invisible? How does the pH of juice change with time? Does all hairspray hold up equally well? The same length? Does hair type affect results? How does the evaporation rate of the crystal medium affect the final size of the crystals? You usually heat water or other liquid to dissolve the solid for crystal growth. Does the rate at which this liquid is cooled be affected by the way crystals grow? What effect do ingredients have on crystals? How do different fertilizers affect the way plants grow? What chemical is best when melting ice from a sidewalk or road? Does the use of colored mulch affect the plant? How do various factors affect seed germination? Factors you could test include the intensity, duration or type of light, temperature, amount of water, presence/absence of certain chemicals or presence/absence of soil. You can look at the percentage of seeds that germinate, or the rate at which the seeds germinate. How are plants affected by the distance between them? How hard is the average backpack at school when a student brings it? How do different chemical treatments affect seed germination rates? What conditions affect the ripening of the fruit? How much of your household waste can you turn into compost? What type of sole shoes get the best traction? Is it slippery? How are different soils affected by erosion? Do people who exercise a lot eat the same number of calories as those who exercise less? Some of the tips below may seem obvious, but there's a good reason for this: they work. Most top MBA programs, for example, consider students with substantial real-world experience in the business world to be a huge plus, if not a specific requirement for admission. If a student plans to switch directly from earning a university degree to a postgraduate degree, the best substitute for work experience is a summer internship (or two) with a reputable company. 5 Meet your instructors and professors This form of networking is a great tool for future Master's students. What we're looking for is someone to drive, someone who's passionate about pursuing their title because they want to, not because they have to. And we also want people who are team players and will get along with others in the class. What is the largest red flag you see on apps? The one that really stands out is the spelling mistakes. We have an essay file, but it's just a one-page essay. So if they can't have time enough to compose a one-page essay about themselves without spelling mistakes, or if the writing is bad and doesn't do well, that's definitely a red flag. Any other points students should pay attention to? Our program is highly quantitative, so when we look at the transcripts and find that the applicant accepted accounting and financial grades as an undergraduate and did the wrong thing, that's a red flag, even if it doesn't necessarily mean that we throw that application out. Links can also be a red flag. We're looking for that team player, someone who's going to be a member of our community. Sometimes something in the link may indicate a problem. Again, we would not directly reject this person, but it might give us reason to ask for an interview to discuss our concerns. The point is, we look at it like we're on the same team as the candidate. People have a misconception that those of us who are in admissions are these big gates and we don't want anyone in our programs, or we keep closing doors to people. The reality is that we want to help students. Do you have any recent advice you would like to give to applicants? Students should not hesitate to contact admissions people, especially those in schools that are most interested. And remember, there are no stupid questions. Many students think they can't talk to admissions staff until they sign up. We are more of a resource or as a customer service program than anything else. We're here to answer questions and provide honest answers so students know what they're getting into. We're not here to kick people out. We try to advise them, help them and be a resource. Also, look for a program that suits you, not one that suits the public. I mean, it's easy to look up the rankings and see who's listed at the top. But that doesn't mean that one of these programs will be best in your individual case. And since so many schools now offer MBA programs, you may find that niche that program that can give you what you are For. Preparing the perfect business school application After compiling a list of potential business schools, students can start the application process. Students should start as soon as possible so that they have enough time to create a complete and compelling package of applications. Application form Check the school's website or call the admissions office to see when its online application will continue. If you fill out a paper application, ask when they will be available and get a few copies as soon as possible. Carefully follow all application instructions and note the filing date along with other related deadlines, such as the last day you can submit transcripts or test results. Transcripts Students should contact their high school seniors and have their final transcripts sent directly to all schools on their list. Anecdotal transcripts or transcripts sent by the applicant are generally not accepted. Students who have completed some postsecondary classes or completed a university degree must obtain transcripts from their postsecondary institutions. School test results have different requirements when it comes to test results. Prospective students should be aware that their school of choice has minimum scoring requirements or if they prefer a particular type of test. Undergraduates may have to submit an ACT, SAT or SAT subject test score. Graduate students should look for gre or gmat requirements. Letters of recommendation Some schools, especially at graduate level, may require applicants to submit letters of recommendation. Students should contact potential referral physicians at least three weeks in advance and provide them with all the necessary information, including what the letter should contain and when and where it should be sent. Personal statement or statement of intent Potential business students at the university and postgraduate level can also write a short essay describing themselves, their experiences and what they hope to gain from the program if accepted. Rolling Rolling admissions allow students to submit their applications at any time between a large window. The school considers applications as they are accepted, rather than reading and replying to requests at once after the filing deadline.
